

1. More and more people lack access to decent work

- Unemployment impact of COVID 19
- In work poverty real wages decreasing
- Forced labour
- Business models based on vulnerable work (seasonal, temporary, agency jobs)



2. National governments struggle to protect human/labour rights

From some extreme examples.....



.....To frequent situations

- Lack of social and legal protections for vulnerable workers (e.g. seasonal, agency, freelance, migrants)
- Failure to «regulate» and control labour intermediation
- Insufficient enforcement mechanisms (e.g. labour inspections)





4. Emphasis on due diligence


- 1. Prevent, mitigate and remediate (incl. compensate) for potential negative impacts



4. The State's cross sector response (1)


Law 199/2016 illicit intermediation

- Improved definition of labour exploitation
- Not only the intermediary but also the «labour user»
- Whether or not violent, threatening and intimidating behaviours are used

Work done with Carnstone in Italy - Action

- In late Feb 2022, webinar in Italian on responsible recruitment. All Italian users invited - 16 users from 8 printers joined
- Resources provided post webinar: Code of Conduct,
 Session slides, Best practise guidance
- Run anonymous surveys to encourage input and discussions
- Discussion focused on the challenge of identifying criminal/illegal recruiters and the importance of recruiting directly

Around ¾ of suppliers more confident to tackle forced labour issues after attending the session

34 of suppliers unsure or not ready to provide info to customers in response to new legislation

Over half requested more help




